

'Make Them Grovel': The 1976 West Indies Cricket Tour Bristol West Indies, 7.30pm, Donation

The 1976 West Indies tour to England came at a time of mounting provocations against black communities both by fascist groups and by the institutionally racist police forces. The situation was inflamed by England Captain and native South African Tony Greig, who before the tour claimed 'I intend to make them grovel', a comment which came amid the controversy about apartheid and sporting boycotts. Includes a showing of the BBC documentary *Nation on Film - The 1976 West Indies cricket tour – on and off the field*

Tuesday16th November From The Ford Workers' Group to Made In Dagenham

The Hatchet (upstairs), 7.30pm, Donation *Panel: Carlos Guarita. Brian Ashton*

Ford plants in the 1970s were epicentres of worker militancy as recently depicted in the film *Made In Dagenham*. Carlos was a founder member of the Ford Dagenham Workers' Group and Brian worked at the Halewood plant from 1970 till late '77. They will discuss the reality of life in the Ford Company, the hidden history of the equal pay disputes and the changes that have taken place since that era.

Easton Community Centre, 7.00pm, Donation Speakers: Anandi Ramamurthy

In the mid 1970s, a new generation of South Asian youth were growing up in Britain. This period saw heightened fascist and racist activity, increasing police violence and discriminatory immigration laws. A racist murder in Southall sparked the formation of the Southall Youth Movement. The SYM made up of mostly young Asian but including some African-Caribbean men, took it upon themselves to defend their community against racist attacks. Using the film *Kala Tala* Anandi Ramamurthy charts the rise of the SYM and how it helped to create the countrywide Asian Youth Movement.

Monday 22nd November Grunwick: The End Of An Era?

The '76–'78 strike over trade union recognition at the Grunwick Film Processing Laboratories in North London is iconic in left-wing history. During a decade of industrial unrest, this dispute became a cause célèbre of trade unionism and at its height involved thousands of unionists and police in confrontations. This meeting includes excerpts from the films *Stand Together* and *The Great Grunwick Strike a History* introduced by film director Chris Thomas, as well as eye witness accounts of the picketing by supporters of the strike.

Tuesday 23rd November Spies, Lies And The Coup: State Repression In The 70s The Hatchet (upstairs), 7.30pm, Donation Speaker: Larry O'Hara

The rise of militancy in the workplace, universities and the new left in the early 1970s Britain generated a reaction by the 'secret state'. A major campaign was launched by the security services to infiltrate and destabilise radical groups culminating in a plot to overthrow Harold Wilson's Labour government in the mid '70s. Investigative researcher and writer Larry O'Hara will give an overview of the period, looking at the tactics and strategies of the secret services.

Sweet Liberation (community choir), Richard Burley & Danny Ward (acoustic set), Red Notes Choir (4 part harmony), Lynda Sanderson & Pauline Setterfield (opera singer and organist). A celebration of roles played by St. Wulfstan, Thomas Clarkson and the Seven Stars pub played in gaining freedom.

Saturday 27th November How We Won: Strikes In The 70s

The highpoint of workers' militancy in the '70s was in the early years of the decade when rank and file workers led successful actions across industry. This meeting will examine the crucial strikes of miners, builders and dockers as well as industrial action in Bristol in order to understand how the these disputes were won. NUM member Dave Douglass, author of *The Wheel's Still in Spin*, was a pitman for 40 years. Mike Richardson (UWE) was a print worker in Bristol.

Saturday 27th November Glam-Punk Disco Inferno

We're taking you back to the 70s with a night of tunes that rocked the decade. Disco and Glam set from DJ Pretty Boy to Punk, Ska and Skin from DJ Dabble.

Monday 29th November The U.S. Anti-Vietnam War Movement

The student rebellion in America in 1968 was fuelled by revulsion to the Vietnam War into which many students were being drafted to serve as junior officers. Mike provides an eyewitness account of the student revolt. Roger surveys the hidden history of resistance to the war in the US armed forces, which ranged from desertion and sabotage through to outright mutiny.

Thursday 2nd December Punk And The Pistols

A showing of the influential Arena documentary (1995), which takes a different angle to the more widely known *The Filth and the Fury*. From the suburban backgrounds of the first '100 punks', *Punk and the Pistols* examines the anger, ideas and inspiration which led to a movement that shook Britain and spanned the globe. Includes interviews with Jordan, John Lydon, Malcolm McLaren, Siouxsie Sioux and Vivienne Westwood. Introduced by the film's director Paul Tickell.

Marco will outline the effect of the Italian Autonomists on the German Workers movement in the '70s.

Tuesday 7th December 'Can't Do Nothin' If You Ain't Bad': The League Of Revolutionary Black Workers
